Here or not?

Though the decision was taken to remove the composers from Section 5, they still need to finish composting what they contain. In light of this please do NOT put anything in them.

Appropriate items such as grass clippings, and cut up clean and disease free garden clippings can still be put in the Section 4 composter. Though there is less to feast on, the garden is teaming with life and a joyous place to be in. It's becoming rare to see the communal areas without someone enjoying themselves, alone or with a friend in peace. These spaces are a special and beautiful gift from our community to the greater one. We are all so very honoured to be part of it. (That said, you might want to keep an eye on the figs in Communal A - if you get a good one, they're pretty yummy.)

After some six months of build up, Henry and Trevor at <u>everclean</u> <u>Recycling</u> offered us one of the first samples of their upcoming line of planter boxes. It can be found right behind Marg's bench, temporarily planted with two pots. Made from recycled plastic and wood pellets, they hope to open their factory in Abbotsford. Astoundingly dense, the box has an expected 20 year lifespan, and when finished is intended to be ground up and recycled into new product. We are hoping to convince the city to use us as a trial garden - on fences, the tool shed or the accessible beds - to see how it stands up here. MCG is seemingly at the instar of cleaning up the tons of waste we as a society have so foolishly generated. Thank you Henry and Trevor.

Your exec has been asked to (re)communicate the following invasive weed information, after which we will return to our regularly scheduled programming. Morning glory/bindweed, buttercup, gout weed, couch grass/crab grass, etc. We all need to return to more diligent removal of these Invasive plants as they are building up again, especially around edges Section fence lines and individual plot boxes. These weeds are extremely aggressive. They have very deep roots that multiply like crazy and spread rapidly to neighbouring plots and sections. In fairness to your fellow gardeners, please be diligent in digging out and removing roots as deeply as possible on a regular basis and disposing of the roots, stems, tops and seed Away from the garden. Do NOT put any part of these invasive plants in the composter.
